"COMMEMORATING THE LIFE, DEATH, AND RESURRECTION OF JESUS CHRIST."

Dear Friends

New life is a power I have been reflecting upon during this Lent leading into our Holy Week and then Easter. I see new life all around in nature producing new daffodils in our pasture, new babies being born into our parish (Hi Holly) and of course, the hour going forward this weekend. However, the lens of Jesus' resurrection isn't just about new life that happened in the past, it is an invitation to encounter a resurrection power and new life for today in 4 distinct ways.

1. An Easter power that fills us with new life:

In Luke 24:5-6, the angels at the empty tomb asked the women: "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; He has risen!" This powerful truth speaks to the heart of Easter.

Jesus' resurrection overcomes the finality of death, showing that no situation is beyond God's power. It tells us that even in the darkest moments — when hope feels lost — God is still working to bring new life.

2. An Easter Power that begins renewal:

Paul writes in 2 Corinthians 5:17: "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!"

This is the first verse I ever memorised 40 years ago through the Navigators. To memorise Scripture embeds it in your mind so that you can meditate on it, day and night.

The Easter power of resurrection isn't just about what happened to Jesus —it's about what can happen in us. Just as Jesus rose from the grave, we are invited to rise from the struggles, sin, and burdens that weigh us down. Easter calls us to embrace the grace that allows us to be renewed beyond what is possible here on earth

3. An Easter Power that creates courage.

In John 20:19-22, the disciples were hiding in fear after Jesus' death. Yet when the risen Christ appeared to them, He greeted them with peace and breathed the Holy Spirit upon them, commissioning them to step out in faith.

This passage speaks deeply to those who feel stuck, uncertain, or afraid. Jesus doesn't expect us to be perfect — He meets us where we are and empowers us to move forward with courage.

4. An Easter Power as the source of living hope.

Peter affirms this in 1 Peter 1:3: "Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In His great mercy, He has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead."

This "living hope" is the foundation of Easter. It's not just a momentary feeling, but a steady confidence that God is always at work — even when we can't yet see the outcome. This Easter, we're reminded that the same power that raised Jesus from the dead is available to us — to renew our hearts, heal our wounds, and guide us into a life of purpose and hope. Whether that means mending a broken relationship, finding strength in a season of struggle, or embracing joy after a time of grief, Easter shows us that new life is always possible.

What power and "new life" will this Easter make real for you? Chris

What colour is Easter?

What customs happen at Easter?

I'm sure the first one you think of is getting



Easter eggs and eating lots of chocolate! Then you might think of going on an egg hunt or decorating a hardboiled egg and then rolling it down a hill to crack it.

Did you know:

- 1-An Easter egg symbolizes the empty tomb of Jesus.
- 2-Eggs represent new life.
- 3. We roll 'Eggs' after Easter Worship in graveyard.



4 - In medieval times eating eggs during lent was forbidden and so on Easter Sunday tucking into an egg was a real treat!

5-In the Orthodox tradition eggs were painted red to

symbolise the blood that Jesus shed on the cross

There are customs that happen in a church that you might not have noticed. What colour is Easter? Look up at the front of the church and see what colour the cloth on the alter table is.

We don't pick any colour of cloth to go on the alter. Through the ages Christians have come to associate different colours with different religious ideas. Sometimes the cloth can be red, green, blue or white and they all have special meanings.

What colour is Easter?

During Lent the cloth is purple.

Purple is the colour of penitence or feeling sorry.

concentrate on
their relationship
with God in
preparation for Holy
Week and Jesus
dying on the cross.



Purple is also the colour of royalty and the colour of

Kings. Purple dye was very expensive hundreds of years ago so only rich people could afford purple cloth. On Palm Sunday the people lined the streets as Jesus rode into Jerusalem and cheered him like a king.



On Easter morning you will notice that the colour of the cloth will change. What colour would you pick for the cloth for Easter morning? I like yellow as it reminds me of the sunshine and all the lovely daffodils at this time of year. The church has chosen white

and sometimes gold to remind us that Christ is born anew and has washed our sins away and made us clean. White is a colour we associate with celebration and closeness to God.

Look out for the colour of the alter cloth in church and watch it change throughout the year.

Pentecost is the next season that starts in June. What colour will it be?




Saintfield Parish 250th update



1776 - 2026









2026 is a very significant year for Saintfield Parish as it will mark the 250th Anniversary of the Parish Church being consecrated for worship. It's the same year as the American Declaration of independence (July 4th) as well as the year when John Constable (the painter) was born.

The Select Vestry have been discussing how this Anniversary could be used to both celebrate our past but also help us en-vision the future 25 years. We want this mixture of 250th 'moments' to see where we have come from, generations of faithfulness that provided us with so much today. However, we must see the good foundations we must lay for future congregations as they also 'Speak Jesus' in new and relevant ways to all the community of Saintfield.

So far, some key Sundays are already in the Diary with the Archbishop of Armagh John Mc Dowell being with us for our main Service of Celebration in March 2026. Our own bishop David is with us at Harvest and our Holy Week will have a range of preachers to lead and guide us from God's Word.

Another key events will focus on a History Weekend in June (rather like the one we had for the Platinum Celebration for our late Queen Elizabeth II). Other events will take place in different seasons of the year and we will invite the Saintfield Community to be part of what is happening.

I hope and pray that our partnership with Pastor Da-vid in La Paz, Bolivia will be deepened with a possible visit to that Church and its congregation. SAMS Ireland are happy to explore this with us.

We are considering 1 or 2 merchandise to mark the year maybe with Christmas Cards and other items people might buy. We don't necessarily want to have 'pens, pencils and knick-knacks' but items that people might want to keep.

There is much to pray over and plan.

The Select Vestry will be sending a letter to each household in the Parish to invite people to be part of the organisation of such events. The Church Services are reasonably easy to manage, but the community events will need more people in teams to take on the demands of helping make things happen. Please read that letter and consider how you can best help.
