MISSION DIRECTOR WRITES:

CITIZENSHIP IN HEAVEN: A DIVINE PRIVILEGE AND RESPONSIBILITY

In Philippians 3:20, the Apostle Paul writes, "But our citizenship is in heaven. And we eagerly await a Saviour from there, the Lord Jesus Christ." This verse provides a profound reminder of our true identity and destination as Christians. Recently, I embarked on the arduous process of applying for a visa on behalf of my son. The level of detail required and the expense involved highlighted the complexities of earthly citizenship. It demanded determination and perseverance. This experience prompted me to reflect on our heavenly citizenship, a divine gift that contrasts sharply with the bureaucratic challenges of earthly citizenship.

The process of obtaining earthly citizenship or a visa is often fraught with difficulty. It requires extensive documentation, financial resources, and sometimes, seemingly endless waiting. In contrast, our citizenship in heaven

has been graciously granted through faith in Jesus Christ. There is no bureaucratic red tape, no exhaustive list of requirements, and no fees to pay. It is a gift freely given by the grace of God through the sacrifice of His Son. As Christians, we can rest in the assurance that our heavenly citizenship is secure, not because of our efforts, but because of His love and mercy.

The missionaries of the past understood the significance of this heavenly citizenship. They carried the message of Christ with them wherever they went, demonstrating through their lives that they served a higher kingdom. They brought hope, love, and the good news of salvation to many, embodying the principles of the kingdom of heaven. Their determination and unwavering faith in the face of adversity serve as a powerful example for us today.



In late January 2024, Bangor Parish Church buzzed with the warmth of camaraderie and the excitement of cultural exchange as it welcomed a team of six visitors from Salta, North Argentina. Their journey, though fraught with challenges including a stormy sea crossing, culminated in a weeklong immersion into the heart of Northern Ireland's church life.

This visit led by Vicar General Daniel Lescano, was not merely a casual encounter but the fruit of a longstanding partnership between Bangor Parish Church and the Anglican Church of San Andres. Over recent years, the relationship has blossomed, fostering regular termly Zoom prayer sessions where leaders shared encouragement and prayed for one another.

Upon their arrival, the Argentine team wasted no time delving into the local church scene. They exchanged stories of church planting with South Lisburn Community Church, offering insights from their recent endeavours in neighbourhood outreach back home. Daniel Lescano's meeting with some church leaders from Connor diocese heralded

Bangor Parish with Team from Salta, North Argentina (Daniel, Flavia, Sophie, Paula, (front-Dario and Alejandro) exciting prospects, including the initiation of the Church Leaders training Program 'CeFA,' which promises to equip leaders from the Chaco region with invaluable training opportunities.

Throughout the week, the visitors immersed themselves in Bangor's church activities, relishing shared meals and participating in ministry endeavours. Beyond church walls, they savoured some of Northern Ireland's tourist attractions and sampled local delicacies, relishing the cooler climate that offered respite from the scorching temperatures of their homeland.

Sunday services proved to be a highlight, with Daniel Lescano delivering enlightening talks and fostering fellowship over communal meals. For three members of the Argentine team, this trip marked their first trip to the UK, deepening their appreciation for global church partnerships.

As the week drew to a close, the visit stood as a testament to the enriching potential of cross-continental connections. Bangor Parish Church's embrace of the Salta team exemplifies the power of cultural exchange and collaborative ministry. ANGLICAN CENTRE FOR FORMATION, CEFA

As I write about our newly formed Anglican Centre for Formation, CeFA, I'm reminded that the 10 Amerindian students in Ing. Juárez are wrapping up their third block of classes. Tonight and tomorrow, they will be making their way back to their communities spread across northern Argentina. They'll spend a week reconnecting with their families and local congregations before returning for another two-week block of studies.

We're thrilled to have launched this new centre in March 2024. The centre was created to address the issue of Bible poverty in the region and the loss of over 80 pastors and leaders during the two years of the COVID-19 pandemic.

While recognising the need for increased Bible knowledge and theological reflection, CeFA emphasizes three key areas: Conocimiento (Knowledge), Carácter (Character), and Capacidad (Abilities and gifts). In addition to formal classes, students participate in practical tasks in small teams. This can include preparing meals for the group, cleaning dormitories, or maintaining the grounds. Community life



is both challenging and character-building. These experiences are supported by biblical reflection in regular meetings with Rev. Narciso. Sánchez (Director), Rev. Daniel Lescano, (Vicar General), and the entire Ministry Formation team.

The teaching team faces its own challenges, as many of the students have minimal formal education and come from oral learning traditions rather than text-based ones. Classes are in Spanish and not Wichi or Toba, which adds to the challenge both for the students and the teachers. However, these students, recommended by their bishops and pastors, possess a profound desire to learn and be transformed, understanding the privilege of being among the 10 selected for this experience.

Pray with us for the ongoing development of the centre. Building work on the classroom block is still in progress. Pray for the logistics of the students travel to and from their communities each fortnight. Pray that each course will be taught and presented in a way that impacts the students.

ESPERANZA FOSTER HOME

When the Esperanza Foster Home opened in Asuncion in 2005, the State authorities gratefully entrusted us with 5 little girls. We now have the opposite situation, as the start of this year saw 5 little boys being cared for. Then in mid-January the 5 became 6 when a 2-week-old baby boy arrived! Decisions need to be made by the courts about their future but this process can take years so it is important that they can be cared for in a family type environment so that they can thrive. The Bible verse that the project has always felt was significant is Jeremiah 29:11 "For I know the plans I have for you" declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you a hope and a future".

It's a privilege, therefore, to be part of God's work in this way and Ana Maria, who leads the project, is excited about a recent development. Practitioners from a local speech therapy practice are keen to support the home. They have evaluated the 5 toddlers and will be visiting them regularly to carry out specially tailored

programmes. As research increasingly shows us, a child's early years are very significant to their development so the extra help will prove especially valuable.

In February, the Paraguayan team were particularly grateful for the funds that SAMS Ireland were able to send as they weren't sure if they could continue. During the Covid years it had not been possible to put on the usual fundraising events in Paraguay so reserves were low. They are now busy organising a fundraising lunch to take place in May and they have managed to get some great prizes for an auction and a raffle.

Prayers would really be appreciated around the house where the little boys are cared for. It has been put up for sale which is unsettling and may mean a search for new premises.

Along with the boys playing in their baths, the photo below also shows Juana who was the main foster mum in 2005 and, after a short break, is now back working full-time with the children.

There are so many things Jesus could have told them to do, but **earnest prayer** was at the top of his list.
